## Pastoral Reflections

" Sermons, Eulogies, and the Great Mystery" By James Lamkin

Rev. Forrest Church, a prolific author and clergyman in NYC, told the story of a pastor/friend who always previewed his upcoming sermon title and synopsis in each week's congregational newsletter. But there was a problem. The newsletter went to print on Monday or Tuesday; and the pastor had the habit of disappearing on Mondays and Tuesdays.

The office staff could have just left a blank in the bulletin; however, they created a standard announcement.

Next Sunday's Sermon will be: The Great Mystery! What the pastor will preach about is a mystery; but we are certain it will be great!

I love this lighthearted beginning to a rather heavy book: Love & Death: My Journey through the Valley of the Shadow. Forrest Church was dying when he wrote it. He died ten years ago this week. The book contains sermons delivered to his congregation during his last months with esophageal cancer.

Those sermons were love gifts. The congregation was invited to overhear his wounded soul wrestle with the "great mystery" of human life. Frequently, he spoke of his father, the late U.S. Senator from Idaho, Frank Church.

We grieve a lot because we love a lot. Fear, on the other hand, is much simpler and safer. Fear shields the heart from breaking. Fear closes off our heart's loving vulnerabilities. Shuts our minds to paradox and new possibilities.

But who wants to live like that?

This brings me to the "great mystery" of the sermon. A sermon is a heart and head gift of love. And so is a eulogy. *Eulogy* literally means, "to speak the good." It comes from the same root as *evangelism* and good news and gospel. These things are on my mind because of Barry Love's memorial service at Myers Park Baptist last week. JB Gilbert read the gospel lesson. Debby Love asked me to give the eulogy.

The service reflected Barry's love for music... deep and wide, transcendent but intimate. It held high his love for family, gratitude for friends, and investment in church.

Tommy Jones was there. Remember long-time Northside Drivers, Jane and Tom Jones? Their son, Tommy, is on staff at Myers Park Baptist as the Technology Project Manager. He is the spittin' image of both his parents. Said he didn't like retirement, so he went to work in the church! I mentioned Jane and Tom in my eulogy, and how they "laid hands on Barry" when we ordained him as a deacon.



As is the way with eulogies, good news is larger than one person's life. Tommy later told me Barry's eulogy evoked memories of his parents, their love for NDBC, and his gratitude for growing-up among us years ago. Said he had not been called "Tommy" in years ... and he loved it!

Eulogies do such things. They wrap their toes over eternity's edge. They stand on tiptoe, squinting at hope's horizon. Sermons do too; but also, stand toe-to-toe with injustice, and step on toes when need be. Maundy Thursday sermons can even strap on a towel and wash feet and ticklish toes, for God's sake.

Sermons and eulogies. They do their best to speak of The Great Mystery...title or no title.



# News from the Flower Committee

Flowers lovers are needed to support the NDBC flower ministry. This involves a couple of hours on Mondays to

break down the pulpit flowers into a few (usually 2 or 3) smaller arrangements and to deliver them to church members who are sick, who have lost a loved one, or who are unable to attend church because of chronic health issues. As we work in teams of 2, it does not take long to arrange the flowers. You do not need prior experience arranging. You can also volunteer to be a deliverer of flower arrangements only. Each committee member's commitment is One Monday per month. If you can help but are not available on Mondays, it is possible to wait until the Sunday service is over, make the arrangements and leave them at church for someone to deliver on Monday or deliver them on Sunday afternoon. Having delivered flowers and having been the recipient of these bouquets, I know how much it can mean to both the preparer, deliverer, and recipient.
